Re: VLCT Board Sets DY15 Dues

Date: November 1, 2013

The Vermont League of Cities and Towns Board of Directors has set the organization's dues for the dues year beginning in July of 2014 at \$1.04 per capita, based on the 2010 U.S. Census population figures. The per municipality service fee is \$800 for municipalities with either no employees or more than 50 employees, and \$950 for municipalities with between one and 50 employees. Dues increases are capped at a 10% increase or \$500, whichever is less.

Attached is a dues list for DY15 (right-hand columns) for inclusion in your budgets for next year. **This is not a bill. Do not send in your dues now!** We will send you a bill in June of next year, along with a reminder that the VLCT Bylaws require members to make full payment of dues billed.

The dues structure reflects an increase of two cents per capita and \$25 on the municipal service fee, with an additional \$150 service fee for those cities and towns that were required to secure their employee health insurance through Vermont Health Connect. This dues structure caps the increases caused by this combination of changes at 10% or \$500, whichever is less. There are 92 cities and towns whose increases are capped.

Total dues revenue will increase by 5.67%. Absent the temporary health insurance service surcharge described below, the dues would have increased only 2.48%. Two hundred and seven cities and towns will see their dues increase by between \$100 and \$300.

In June, 2013, we notified you of the decision of the VLCT Board and the VLCT Health Trust Board to provide assistance to all VLCT members regarding health insurance reform and the changing obligations of employers for 2014 and beyond. We also indicated in that correspondence that a "very modest supplemental dues assessment will be requested of all members with employees in recognition of this enhanced member benefit for the dues year beginning July 1, 2014." The attached listing of dues reflects VLCT's core needs coupled with continuing to provide health insurance advice and consultation to our members beyond December 31, 2013, when the VLCT Health Trust no longer has most of its former revenue base from health insurance brokerage fees.

Demands for training, technical assistance and information from the Municipal Assistance Center continue to grow. Dues provide over one-half of the revenues necessary to fund these services, with the remainder coming from workshop registrations, publication sales and other fees for service.

VLCT Unemployment Insurance Trust, Inc. The 2014 legislative session lines up to be another challenging one for Vermont local governments. Issues that will impact municipalities include lakeshore zoning, the renewable energy siting process, escalating state education property tax rates, impacts on communities from illicit drug transactions, the housing of offenders and the mentally ill, and continued demands on transportation funding and will likely be among those tackled this spring.

The total VLCT dues proposed represent just .221% of total municipal property taxes collected. Hopefully you and your voters still believe that the services you derive from your membership in VLCT warrants such an investment.

Please remember that membership in the VLCT Health Trust, VLCT PACIF, and the VLCT Unemployment Trust is contingent upon your membership in VLCT.

As mentioned above, the **Health Trust** staff have been working around the clock assisting cities and towns to obtain health insurance coverage for their employees through Vermont Health Connect. It now appears that the struggle will continue well into the next year, but the proposed dues will allow us to stand by you. The Health Trust continues to provide members not participating in the exchange the ability to secure coverage through a **variety of competitively priced plan choices**, focusing on the three core carriers in Vermont: **Blue Cross/Blue Shield**, **CIGNA**, and **MVP**. By continuing to offer carrier choice to our larger employers along with the added value of the Trust's unmatched complement of employee benefits (including dental, vision, life, disability, and long-term care insurance) available for all municipalities, Trust members receive the best value for their money. The Health Trust will also continue to make available the Health Advocate program for employers and subscribers to resolve health coverage and resource questions, and your Employee Assistance Program (EAP) will be on call for stress management, family problems, addiction issues, and a host of other concerns.

Though the physical wounds to municipal infrastructure resulting from Tropical Storm Irene are to a great degree healed, they made the value of **VLCT PACIF** to all our members painfully clear, as they benefitted from the broad coverage, excellent re-insurance, and prompt service and claims payments. Our 2014 renewal packets will be in the mail later this month. The **Unemployment Insurance Trust** 2014 rates stabilized after unemployment claims skyrocketed due to the economic downturn and changes in the state unemployment wage base, but that represents a very small portion of town budgets.

The Board sees many difficult challenges for Vermont local government in the coming months and feels that we need a strong League to help you meet them.

Vermont League of Cities and Towns 2013 Overview Serving and Strengthening Vermont Local Government

The Vermont League of Cities and Towns (VLCT) is a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization that is owned by its member municipalities and directed by a 13-member Board of Directors comprised of municipal officials from across the state elected by the membership.

VLCT's mission is to serve and strengthen Vermont local government. All 246 Vermont cities and towns are members of VLCT, along with 145 other municipal entities, including villages, solid waste districts, regional planning commissions and fire districts.

Vermonters use local government services—including highways, police, fire, recreation, libraries, sewer, and water—on a daily basis. In large part, volunteer elected and appointed municipal officials lead these local governments.

VLCT provides the following services to its member cities and towns, so that they may provide their citizens with quality services at affordable costs:

- Legal, consulting and education services. In the past year, VLCT answered nearly 3,000 inquiries for assistance from municipal officials. Our Municipal Assistance Center (MAC) conducted 23 workshops that attracted more than 1,500 attendees. Our new Municipal Dog Control Workshop, for example, drew an audience of more than 100. Additionally, MAC conducted 14 "on-site" workshops held at municipal offices on a wide range of topics. Handbooks produced by MAC—including our new best-seller, "The Big Book of Woof," which explains municipal officials' responsibilities to dog issues—may be purchased or accessed free of charge on the Resource Library page of our website. The Library also contains nearly 1,000 other electronic documents, including technical papers, model polices, and newsletter articles that are accessible to the general public. MAC has also retained the services of professionals in municipal finance, administration, and policing to provide consulting advice to towns.
- Advocacy. VLCT's Advocacy Department lobbies the state and national governments to ensure that municipalities have the resources and authority they need to serve their citizens. VLCT is a leader in the education property tax debate, enhancing local voter authority in governance decisions, land use discussions such as lakeshore zoning and renewable energy generator siting, and securing revenues for town highway and bridge maintenance programs. Municipalities will face significant challenges in the 2014 legislature as limited financial resources at the national and state level force more demand for services to the local level.
- Purchasing opportunities to provide needed services at the lowest cost. Examples include municipal unemployment, property, casualty, and workers' compensation insurance coverage for town operations. The VLCT Health Trust continues to assist towns with Vermont Health Connect and to help municipalities not in the exchange secure health insurance through the marketplace. The substantial municipal damage resulting from Tropical Storm Irene and the storms of the summer of 2013 makes the value of VLCT Property and Casualty Intermunicipal Fund (PACIF) to all our members painfully clear, as they benefitted from the broad coverage, excellent re-insurance, and prompt service and claims payments. In 2010, our three Trusts were responsible for \$43 million in municipal tax dollars spent for insurance and risk management services.
