ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL OR STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION: Massing - Rectangular block with intersecting gable on north-west elevation. Flat roofed vertical sided addition on north-west elevation. Raised gabled entrance porch. Projecting eaves. Fenestration - 2/2 sash. Plain trim. Multiple paned windows in addition. Entrance - Queen Anne door with square light. Enrichments - Corner boarding and facia board beneath eaves. RELATED STRUCTURES: (Describe) STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: This large structure was probably built in the decade following the close of the American revolution (c. 1785-95). The frame is of sawn and hewn beams of 12"-16". The siding is of 3 1/2" x 30" x 20' planks pegged onto the frame vertically to cover two stories. A large central chimney has fireplaces on both the cellar and first floor levels. The base of the chimney has a layer of 1" thick boards through it, a foot or so above the dirt floor, to prevent moisture from wicking up the chimney. The size of the timbers used in its construction suggest that the building was erected soon after resettlement began at the Falls c. 1784, when it would have been cheaper to build with large beams and boards, because wood was so plentiful and millpower so scarce. The size and design of the building suggest that it was a storehouse for some trader at the Falls, built for holding large quantities of grain and farm produce which farmers bartered to cover the cost of those things which they needed to purchase. Despite speculation that Ira Allen was the builder (the construction is very similar to the Ethan Allen house on the intervale).
