15 16	Resolved by the City Council of the City of Burlington, as follows:
17	That WHEREAS, World AIDS Day is observed every year on December 1st; and
18	WHEREAS, the World Health Organization established World AIDS Day in 1988 to ensure
19	renewed and continual constructive attention to the grave threat posed by both HIV-AIDS and the
20	debilitating medical conditions, pain, suffering and social-familial-economic hardships associated with
21	HIV infection; and
22	WHEREAS, World AIDS Day provides governments, national AIDS programs, faith
23	organizations, community organizations, and individuals with an opportunity to raise awareness and
24	focus attention on the global AIDS epidemic; and
25	WHEREAS, in the United States, The Center for Disease Control reports that there are more
26	than one million people in the U. S. currently living with HIV infection, and more than 56,000
27	Americans become infected with HIV annually; and
28	WHEREAS, among the many groups and persons whose lives have been shattered by HIV,
29	approximately ten-thousand people affected by bleeding disorders, specifically people with
30	Hemophilia, who contracted HIV (as well as Hepatitis C and other viruses) as a result of tainted blood
31	products prescribed for use during the 1980's and 1990's; and
32	WHEREAS, family members of infected persons with bleeding disorders contracted HIV from
33	the infected persons who, at the time, were unaware of their seroconversion; and
34	WHEREAS, among the infected, no less than eight thousand have died; and
35	WHEREAS, the prognosis is hopeful for people living with HIV and related infections; people

10	with HIV and their families confront daily the fear of disease, pain and suffering associated with HIV,
11	and financial and social challenges accompanying HIV infection; and
12	WHEREAS, in the past, the medical-pharmaceutical community and government regulators
13	failed to exercise reasonable, responsible and appropriate diligence that likely would have profoundly
14	mitigated if not forestalled the HIV epidemic inflicted on persons who received contaminated blood
15	and blood products; and
16	WHEREAS, with improved safety and monitoring of blood, blood products and other
17	medications, patients with chronic illness must depend on safe, available medications to effectively
18	respond to illness; and
19	WHEREAS, it is appropriate to recognize those in the bleeding disorders community who must
50	confront past and future co-morbidities associated with genetic and chronic illness; and
51	WHEREAS, Vermont CARES is a local non-profit organization whose mission is to improve
52	the quality of life, create compassionate communities and prevent the spread of HIV by working with
53	people affected by HIV/AIDS as a catalyst for social and individual change;
54	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the City Council recognizes December 1st, 2009 as
55	World AIDS Day in the City of Burlington and marks this solemn occasion by identifying the need to
56	address issues, increase public awareness of HIV and AIDS, encourage more wide screen testing
57	within our community and increase support and care for community members living with HIV/AIDS;

59	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the City Council acknowledges the work and advocacy of
50	Vermont CARES for Vermonters living with AIDS and HIV and their families and friends, and thanks
51	them for their continued dedication to this important cause.; and
